2024-25 Highlights at The Commandery

- A new exhibition supported by the UK Government's Towns Fund transports visitors back to 1890 to explore the darker corners of Victorian life in Worcester, from childhood to the funeral parlour, and all the trials and tribulations faced in between.
- More museum collections available to visitors including Police uniform, chemist's medicine bottles and equipment, a funeral bier and a prison door originally from Worcester's Guildhall.
- The introduction of a new evening music event, adult craft workshops, a successful new café partnership, 30% increase in room hires, and steady bookings for the Commandery Quest Escape Room all help to diversify and increase income.
- Visit England's Welcome accolade (VAQAS mystery shopper assessment) reflects the outstanding quality of the visitor welcome and experience.
- A new mural to welcome visitors to The Commandery commissioned from local artist Anna Best.

Inclusion in a popular history podcast introduced The Commandery to celebrity historian Dan Snow's 1.5million subscribers.

2024-25 Highlights at Worcester City Art Gallery & Museum

Record-breaking visitor numbers: more than 85,000 people visited – a 23% increase on 2023-2024.

Visitor facility improvements have been made:

- Lift and toilets refurbished with support from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.
- Museum Gallery and activity space redecorated and redisplayed thanks to Arts Council England funding.
- Opening hours refocused to support access for residents and tourists, bringing £1m into Worcester's economy from day trips and overnight stays.

2024-25 Highlights at Worcestershire County Museum

- 500 pupils enjoyed the new Make Do and Mend learning sessions which use the 1940s to introduce the idea of sustainability.
- The Introduction to Blacksmithing course was adapted for Bridge the Gap in Malvern which provides bespoke, supported transition for young people into independence and employment.
- Thanks go to Wychavon District Council who committed UKSPF funding to the purchase of a new display case for the Worcestershire Conquest Hoard.

Museum Collections

The Art Gallery & Museum continues to make progress for Worcester to become a centre for British Impressionism with acquisitions Plough Horses by Dame Laura Knight donated by a private benefactor, Portrait of Stanhope Forbes at the Easel by Elizabeth Forbes and a print of Camille Pissarro's Effet de Pluie, both funded by the Worcestershire Heritage, Arts and Museums charity.

- 410 objects have been newly displayed across the three museums.

- More than 300,000 people have enjoyed objects from the City and County collections displayed across Worcestershire and beyond.

Museum Learning

- 9,033 numbers of formal learning students engaged (onsite, outreach and loans).
- 4,161 students visited the museums, 84% coming from Worcestershire schools.
- 123 outreach boxes loaned to schools supported at least 3,690 children with their classroom learning.
- 90 children and their families took part in the Holiday Activities and Food programme, funded by the Department for Education which offers children eligible for free school meals activities during the Easter, Summer and Winter school holidays.
- Valuable work experience opportunities for Year 12 and 13 students, this year from Haybridge High School and Sixth-Form, King Edwards VI College Stourbridge and University of Worcester.

In December 2024 the museums' fundraising and advocacy charity (charity registration number 11974480) launched a campaign to save the Worcestershire Conquest Hoard; one of the largest Roman Conquest hoards found to date in Britain and one of the most important archaeological discoveries in Worcestershire in the last 100 years. The Hoard consists of 1,368 Iron Age and Roman gold and silver coins, which were gathered into a pot and buried in the ground in the Leigh and Bransford area of Worcestershire. To date the charity has raised over £30,000. The official valuation is awaited but the generous amount of donations has proved how important the Hoard is to the people of Worcestershire.

Looking Forward

- Museums Worcestershire continues to support the Mercian Regiment (Worcestershire) Museum and the Worcestershire Yeomanry Museum to develop a new Worcestershire Soldier display at The Commandery, which has received development funding from National Lottery Heritage Fund.
- Work continues on preparing for the new British Impressionism gallery at the Art Gallery & Museum, made possible by a generous donation from Shirley & Rolf Olsen.
- We build our resilience through planning and income generation to face reductions in subsidy and create a solid foundation ahead of local government reorganisation.
